Quick Note

- Current draft of the plan been through multiple rounds of feedback and iteration.
- Now working with the Strategic Planning Working Group to consolidate and streamline the plan so that it is more actionable, approachable, and easy to use.



Reminders about this Plan/Considerations

- Scope- the scope of this plan is <u>prenatal-to-five</u> and is <u>comprehensive</u>. It's aligned to the new <u>EC CO Framework</u> <u>domains</u>.
- Funding- while the current CO Shines Brighter plan strategies
 were largely funded by the PDG grant, most potential new
 strategies in this plan are <u>not (yet) funded</u>, and where they are,
 it is circumstantial.
- Ownership- the strategies are written such that people at multiple levels of the system could implement or contribute to them



Known Limitations

- Interpretation Cannot determine causality by tracking these outcome indicators alone.
 - Many will be impacted by multiple strategies and other factors.
 - Will also depend on what was implemented, where, or to what extent
- Measures Some of these indicators may not be feasible to measure, not in timely useful ways.
- Evaluation we cannot create a full evaluation plan for the strategic plan,
 i.e., that is out of scope



Approach to the Success Indicators

- The purpose is to have measurable criteria that:
 - o Promote **shared understanding** of success and **accountability**.
 - o Help assess the **progress and effectiveness** of the plan.
- We aimed to provide a **menu** of potential indicators, allowing flexibility to decide in the future where to focus evaluation efforts and resources.
- Per your recommendation, including indicators in the menu that can be tracked at state and/or local levels, including progress and not just outcomes



Types of Success Indicators

- Three types of indicators included, with equity considerations across:
 - o Indicators of **successful implementation** of the strategies
 - o Indicators of **successful outcomes** of the strategies under each goal
 - o Overarching indicators of **successful impact** of the plan and its multiple strategies on children and families



Successful Implementation Indicator Examples

- Policy changes, increases in investments
- # of trainings implemented, # training hours and technical assistance hours provided, # of training and technical assistance participants, # of recipients of resources disseminated
- # of new culturally responsive whole-person health programs, services, activities implemented or expanded, # of participating providers
- Equitable distribution of these resources/implementation of these changes, including access in multiple languages



Successful Outcome Indicator Examples

Increase in:

- % of pregnant people and children with insurance coverage;
- % of pregnant people with timely prenatal care
- # of participants in programs or services...
- # and % of people receiving mental health screenings and referrals
- # and % of timely referrals to EI; Decrease wait time...
- Family knowledge...
- Nutritious meals served in ECE settings
- Social-emotional supports provided in ECE settings
- Equity in access, enrollment, participation across race, language, and geography; decrease disparities



Successful Impact Indicator Examples- Quantitative

Increase equity/decrease disparities in the following:

- Increase in perinatal health; Increase positive birth outcomes (full-term, appropriate birth weight)
- Improved child health (growth, physical health, use of health services, preventative care, eating habits)
- Increase in positive child development outcomes
- Decrease in suspensions and expulsions
- Reductions in child maltreatment
- Increases in economic mobility
 - o e.g., Increase in families with living wages (Living Wage Calculator; ALICE framework)



Successful Impact Indicator Examples- Qualitative

Increase equity/decrease disparities in the following qualitative outcomes. Families report:

- Greater ease in finding and accessing programs, services, and resources to meet their and their children's needs
- Satisfaction and positive experiences with programs and services
- Smooth transitions between programs and providers
- Reduced stress
- Social-emotional support, positive social connections
- Positive parenting practices
- Positive child development outcomes
- Greater economic security and mobility
